TTU1002: Introduction to Theological Education; 2 Cr. (Yr. A, Required for New Students) Prof. Jerry Reisig jreisig@nyts.edu

Dates: June 7 & 8 (Wednesday and Thursday) 6:00 pm – 9:00pm

This required course is an introduction to theological education as well as the academic resources NYTS provides to aid in your formation and ministerial identity. Since this is an online, asynchronous course, you will be required to do the readings and respond to forum discussions online, with opportunities to meet online several times throughout the semester. In the forum discussions, the class will discuss practical issues of workload, finance, time management, and curricular structure will be examined. The class will also discuss the role of critical thinking throughout the seminary experience, followed by research, writing and citations development. The course is a 2 credit Pass/No Credit course.

Course Description: In this course, students become familiar with the basic theories and methods of mental health diagnosis and spiritual assessment which are appropriate for pastoral care and counseling. The readings and written assignments required for successful completion of this course are designed to systematically train students in methods of conceptualizing and assessing the spiritual, mental, and emotional status of people in need through the use of particular methods including the DSM-V. Categories of spiritual and mental disorder assessment and diagnosis and corresponding treatment strategies are presented in the context of multidimensional understandings of the human beings.

The United Nations world population study reports that more than half of the world population now lives in urban areas and that by 2050 nearly 70% will live in cities. Well informed, reflective, and highly trained faith community leadership will be critical in order to be effective leaders in this growing movement. Can we project God’s need for transformational faith leaders? Deeply grounded in the urban context, students will reflect biblically and theologically, review historical, contemporary and emerging theories and practices of leadership and organizational behavior, such as, evidenced in the “Black Lives Matter” movement, assess their own leadership style and competencies, and project the gifts and graces of leadership called for to become highly effective faith leaders in the local, national and global urban contexts. Special attention will be given to urbanization as a growing global movement and the contextual leadership skills required to be effective in various settings.
